Guidelines for the Reception of Communion

For Catholics

As Catholics, we fully participate in the celebration of the Eucharist when we receive Holy Communion. We are encouraged to receive Communion devoutly and frequently. In order to be properly disposed to receive Communion, participants should not be conscious of grave sin and normally should have fasted for one hour. A person who is conscious of grave sin is not to receive the Body and Blood of the Lord without prior sacramental confession except for a grave reason where there is no opportunity for confession. In this case, the person is to be mindful of the obligation to make an act of perfect contrition, including the intention of confessing as soon as possible (canon 916). A frequent reception of the Sacrament of Penance is encouraged for all.

For Our Fellow Christians

We welcome our fellow Christians to this celebration of the Eucharist as our brothers and sisters. We pray that our common baptism and the action of the Holy Spirit in this Eucharist will draw us closer to one another and begin to dispel the sad divisions which separate us. We pray that these will lessen and finally disappear, in keeping with Christ's prayer for us "that they may all be one" (John 17:21).

Because Catholics believe that the celebration of the Eucharist is a sign of the reality of the oneness of faith, life, and worship, members of those churches with whom we are not yet fully united are ordinarily not admitted to Holy Communion. Eucharistic sharing in exceptional circumstances by other Christians requires permission according to the directives of the diocesan bishop and the provisions of canon law (canon 844 § 4). Members of the Orthodox Churches, the Assyrian Church of the East, and the Polish National Catholic Church are urged to respect the discipline of their own Churches. According to Roman Catholic discipline, the Code of Canon Law does not object to the reception of communion by Christians of these Churches (canon 844 § 3).

For Non-Christians

We also welcome to this celebration those who do not share our faith in Jesus Christ. While we cannot admit them to Holy Communion, we ask them to offer their prayers for the peace and the unity of the human family.

For Those Not Receiving Holy Communion

All who are not receiving Holy Communion are encouraged to express in their hearts a prayerful desire for unity with the Lord Jesus and with one another.



I consecrate myself to you forever, for my firm desire is to love your Divine Son Jesus. Mary, since those devoted to you have never been known to perish, pray that I too may be saved. Amen.

2025 A YEAR OF JUBILEE

The tradition of the Jubilee Year is as old as the Bible. One of the earliest written accounts of its practice is found in the book of Leviticus, "You shall treat this fiftieth year as sacred. It shall be a jubilee for you" (25: 8, 10a). The Jubilee was a time of joy, of universal remission, of pardon, and of mercy. Leviticus tells of the blowing of the Yobel (ram's horn) to signal the opening of this special year, hence the origin of the English word, Jubilee.

In the Roman Church, the first recorded jubilee was that of Pope Boniface VIII in A.D. 1300. Referred to as the "year of jubilee" other terms such as "holy year" and "the golden year" were used interchangeably.

The focus of a Year of Jubilee is the spiritual growth of the faithful. Originally, it was to be observed once every one hundred years, then every fifty years. In 1470, Pope Paul II changed the observance to every twenty-five years, as the life expectancy of the faithful was so short.

There are two types of Holy Year or Jubilee: 1) "ordinary," which falls within a specified period of time, and 2) "extraordinary," which is proclaimed for an important event or purpose, during the twenty-five year cycle. To date, there have been twenty-six Ordinary Jubilees. The Year of Jubilee 2025 will be the 27th. The last Extraordinary Jubilee was in 2015, the Year of Mercy. It was the first Extraordinary Jubilee of the third millennium.

The Holy Year is to strengthen faith, encourage works of charity and spiritual union within the Church and in society; it is a time for Christians to deepen their sincerity and faith in Jesus Christ.

The most recognized symbol of a Holy Year is the Porta Sancta or "Holy Door," a tradition established in 1500, symbolizing the doorway of salvation. Pilgrims passing through a designated Porta Sancta may gain a plenary indulgence (remission of temporal punishment due to sin) providing all the regular conditions—confession, Eucharistic Communion, prayer for the Pope—are met. The Holy Door of the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception was first designated and inaugurated for the Great Jubilee of 2000 by Pope Saint John Paul II, and again by Pope Francis in 2015.

On 3 December 2023, the First Sunday of Advent, Archbishop Timothy P. Broglio, of the Archdiocese for the Military Services, U.S.A., president of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), and a member of the National Shrine Board of Trustees, sealed the Holy Door of the National Shrine, thereby uniting the door of this Basilica with that of the Basilica of Saint Peter and reminding us of our communion with the See of Peter and the Universal Church.

The Ordinary Jubilee 2025, "Pilgrims of Hope," will commence with the opening of the Holy Door of the Basilica of Saint Peter in December 2024.

The opening and closing dates of the Jubilee year will be given in the Papal Bull of Indiction, which will be published on the Solemnity of the Ascension, 9 May 2024.
