Guidelines for the Reception of Communion

For Catholics

As Catholics, we fully participate in the celebration of the Eucharist when we receive Holy Communion. We are encouraged to receive Communion devoutly and frequently. In order to be properly disposed to receive Communion, participants should not be conscious of grave sin and normally should have fasted for one hour. A person who is conscious of grave sin is not to receive the Body and Blood of the Lord without prior sacramental confession except for a grave reason where there is no opportunity for confession. In this case, the person is to be mindful of the obligation to make an act of perfect contrition, including the intention of confessing as soon as possible (canon 916). A frequent reception of the Sacrament of Penance is encouraged for all.

For Our Fellow Christians

We welcome our fellow Christians to this celebration of the Eucharist as our brothers and sisters. We pray that our common baptism and the action of the Holy Spirit in this Eucharist will draw us closer to one another and begin to dispel the sad divisions which separate us. We pray that these will lessen and finally disappear, in keeping with Christ's prayer for us "that they may all be one" (John 17:21).

Because Catholics believe that the celebration of the Eucharist is a sign of the reality of the oneness of faith, life, and worship, members of those churches with whom we are not yet fully united are ordinarily not admitted to Holy Communion. Eucharistic sharing in exceptional circumstances by other Christians requires permission according to the directives of the diocesan bishop and the provisions of canon law (canon 844 § 4). Members of the Orthodox Churches, the Assyrian Church of the East, and the Polish National Catholic Church are urged to respect the discipline of their own Churches. According to Roman Catholic discipline, the Code of Canon Law does not object to the reception of communion by Christians of these Churches (canon 844 § 3).

For Non-Christians

We also welcome to this celebration those who do not share our faith in Jesus Christ. While we cannot admit them to Holy Communion, we ask them to offer their prayers for the peace and the unity of the human family.

For Those Not Receiving Holy Communion

All who are not receiving Holy Communion are encouraged to express in their hearts a prayerful desire for unity with the Lord Jesus and with one another.

SAINT CARLO ACUTIS MAY 3, 1991 SOCTOBER 12, 2006



From the day he received his First Communion at the age of 7, Carlo Acutis never missed an appointment with daily Holy Mass. He always tried, either before or after the Eucharistic celebration, to pause before the Tabernacle to adore the Lord, always truly present in the Blessed Sacrament. Our Lady was his great confidant and he never failed to honor her by reciting the Holy Rosary every day. Carlo's modern and up-to-date ways combined perfectly with his profound Eucharistic life and Marian devotion, which helped to make him that very special boy who everyone admires and loves.

To quote Carlo's own words, "Our goal must be the infinite and not the finite. The Infinity is our homeland. We are always expected in Heaven." Another phrase of his was, "All people are born as originals but many die as photocopies." To move towards this goal and not "die as photocopies", Carlo said that our compass must be the Word of God, that we have to measure up to constantly. But to reach such a lofty goal very special measures are necessary: the Sacraments and prayer. In particular, Carlo placed the Sacrament of the Eucharist at the center of his life and he called it "my highway to Heaven".

Carlo was very gifted with everything related to the world of computers so that both his friends and adults with computer engineering degrees considered him a genius. Everyone was amazed at his ability to understand the secrets of computers that are normally only accessible to those who have specialized university degrees. Carlo's interests involved computer programming, film editing, website creation, editing and laying out small publications, and helping those most in need especially children and the elderly.

This young believer of the Diocese of Milan was a mystery, who before he died was able to offer his suffering up for the Pope and the Church.

"To be always united with Jesus, this is my plan of life." These few words Carlo Acutis outline the distinctive feature of his short life: living with Jesus, for Jesus, and in Jesus. "I am happy to die because I lived my life without wasting even a minute of it on anything unpleasing to God."


Carlo Acutis died at the age of 15 of a galloping leukemia, leaving in the memory of all those who knew him a great feeling of emptiness and great admiration for his brief but intense testimony of authentic Christian life.

Carlo Acutis created a website dedicated to cataloguing each reported Eucharistic miracle in the world and maintaining a list of approved Marian apparitions. He launched the website in 2004 and worked on it for two and a half years, involving his entire family in the project. It was unveiled on October 4, 2006, the Feast of Saint Francis, only days before his death. Because he was hospitalized, Carlo was not able to attend the debut of his exhibition at Rome's Church of San Carlo Borromeo. The exhibition was also presented at his high school, the Leo XIII Institute.

SAINT PIER GIORGIO FRASSATI, TOSD APRIL 6, 1901 & JULY 4, 1925



Born in Turin to a wealthy agnostic family, Pier Giorgio Frassati early in life found himself drawn to the faith and serving Christ in the poor. He was particularly known for his prayer and his great love of the outdoors.

Pier Giorgio's friends described him as "an explosion of joy." His sister Luciana in her biography of her brother says that "he represented the finest in Christian youth: pure, happy, enthusiastic about everything that is good and beautiful." He loved sharing his faith and praying with his many friends.

At a young age after starting at a Jesuit school, Pier Giorgio received permission to receive communion daily, which was rare at the time. He also joined the Marian Sodality and Apostleship of Prayer. Often, he would spend hours of the night in an adoration chapel.

He was also known as an avid sportsman and loved the outdoors, particularly mountain climbing. He cultivated a deep appreciation for theater, opera, museums, and poetry, loving to quote Dante.

Pier Giorgio was deeply devoted to Catholic social teaching and serving the poor. He joined the People's Party, based on the principles of Pope Leo XIII's encyclical *Rerum Novarum*, and was known to go to serve the poor in the slums, even giving away his bus fare money and running home to be on time for meals. As his sister said, "Catholic social teaching could never remain simply a theory with [Pier Giorgio]." He would forgo vacations as the family summer home because "if everybody leaves Turin, who will take care of the poor?"

He desired to become a mining engineer, studying at the Royal Polytechnic University of Turin, because he desired to "serve Christ better among the miners".

He was also politically active, both against the communist as well as fascist causes in early twentieth-century Italy. He stood up to police harassing a Church-sponsored protest in Rome once, grabbing a fallen banner and using it to rally his fellow students.

His love for balancing contemplation and action naturally led him to a love for the Dominican order, particularly after reading the sermons of Girolamo Savonarola and writings of Saint Catherine of Siena. In 1922, he joined the Lay Dominicans, taking the name Girolamo after the fierce Renaissance preacher.

Pier Giorgio contracted polio shortly before he was to receive his degree, and doctors believed this was due to his tending to the sick in the slums. But even on his last night of life, his concern remained for the poor, using his paralyzed hand to scrawl a note asking a friend to take medicine to a poor man, Converso.

Thousands turned out for his funeral. Many of the poor and needy who he had served for the past seven years came, and it was through their presence that his parents learned of his service. Just as his parents were surprised at the multitude of destitute and needy, those their son had served were surprised to learn that their friend was the heir to the wealthy and famous Frassati family.

In 1981, his remains were found to be incorrupt, and his body was transferred from the family tomb to the Cathedral of Saint John the Baptist in Turin.

At his beatification in 1990, Saint John Paul II referred to him as the "Man of the Eight Beatitudes" and recalled fondly that "I wanted to pay homage to a young man who was able to witness to Christ with singular effectiveness in this century of ours. When I was a young man, I, too, felt the beneficial influence of his example and, as a student, I was impressed by the force of his testimony."

At 10:00 a.m. on Sunday, September 7, His Holiness Pope Leo XIV presided over the Mass for the Canonization of Blessed Carlo Acutis and Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati in Saint Peter's Square in Vatican City. In unity with the Holy Father and celebrating this joyous day in the life of the Church, the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception has on display a photo and a first-class relic of Saint Carlo Acutis.
